Black takes command of Strike Fighter Wing

Capt. Mark Black relieved Capt. Mark Hubbard as Commander Strike Fighter Wing, U.S. Pacific Fleet (CSFWP) in a time-honored change of command ceremony at Naval Air Station (NAS) Lemoore April 25.

Vice Adm. Allen G. Myers, Commander, Naval Air Forces and the presiding officer, told Hubbard's crew they're also responsible for the wing's success and naval aviation's reputation.

"You are working incredibly long hours, here at home station, on the pitching deck of our carriers, and from remote, dusty forward operating locations – and you are the reason naval aviation is the best in the world," Myers said. "You work hard, and you continue to get the job done working more efficiently, and smarter than ever before."

The wing that Hubbard led since September 2010 is the headquarters for the Navy's west coast strike fighter aircraft. There are currently 15 F/A-18 fleet units homeported at NAS Lemoore, along with four squadrons permanently forward-deployed and homeported in Atsugi, Japan.

Additionally, two fleet replacement squadrons train Navy and Marine Corps strike fighter pilots to fly the Hornet and Super Hornet aircraft.

The fleet replacement squadrons also provide the initial training for maintenance personnel.

CSFWP is also responsible for the Strike Fighter Weapons School Pacific that provides tactics and ordnance training for the strike fighter community.

For leading the Pacific Fleet's strike fighter community and his selfless service in support of the nation's security, Hubbard was presented the Legion of Merit by Vice Adm. Myers.

Surrounded by F/A-18 Hornet and Super Hornet strike fighters at NAS Lemoore's Hangar One, Hubbard also used the change of command as his retirement ceremony. During his 27-year career, Hubbard accumulated more than 5,000 flight hours in A6E Intruder and F/A-18 aircraft along with countless memories and friendships.


"For as long as I can remember all I have wanted to do is to wear our nation's cloth and serve our country," recalled Hubbard. "My journey has been wilder than a young man could've ever dreamed of. I've been blessed with a wealth of friends and wonderful experiences. I've moments and memories that I will reflect on for the rest of my years."

During Hubbard's tenure as CSFWP, Black served as deputy commander. A 1986 graduate of the Virginia Military Institute, Black was designated a Naval Flight Officer in November 1987.

During his remarks, Black thanked Hubbard for his passionate leadership and

RJ Neutra School presented "The Art of Inspiration with Richard Hight" on Thursday, April 26, in recognition of Month of the Military Child and their 50th anniversary celebration.

"We can think of no better time to celebrate RJ Neutra's 50 years of success than during the month dedicated to military children," said John Partin, Neutra School principal.

To wrap up the month-long celebration, Hight, a nationally recognized artist/motivational speaker, made a special guest appearance at RJ Neutra School on board NAS Lemoore. He amazed the audience as he created unique chalk renditions on eight-foot high blank canvases.

"The stunning illustrations were of a

bald eagle which represented America, freedom and choices and a tribute to Neutra's 50th Anniversary with a rendition of the famous Blue Angels. He creates the original artwork in a matter of moment's right in front of the audience," explained Partin.

Hight uses the fine arts to help his audience create strategies for change by turning good ideas into great results. The artwork Hight created provided the foundation for his keynote presentation and discussion.

"To be a great artist, you have to be able to see possibilities. Your teachers see the possibilities and greatness in each of you. Your job is to turn your passions and talents into your destinies," explained Hight.

Hight hails from Oklahoma. As a child, dyslexia led to valuable lessons learned about focusing on strengths and recogniz-

ing possibilities, not limitations. His artistic gift allowed him to express his thoughts and emotions, and his successes built his confidence.

"It is just as important to know who you're not as who you are," said Hight to fourth and fifth graders at Neutra School. "What makes you different can make you great. Be who you are. That's cool."

Hight travels the world to share his message of empowerment and encouragement. His artwork has been placed in museums and over 50 major universities as well as in corporate and private collections. He has been featured on ABC, NBC, CBS, and FOX Networks.

The chalk renditions that Hight created at Neutra will be displayed at the school to serve as a reminder to students to make the right decisions and to focus on their individual talents and gifts.

CASA of Kings County swears in volunteers

Each year in America, it is estimated that thousands of children are victims of child abuse. Sadly, child abuse and neglect are a reality in communities across the nation. Although a strong family unit is the best deterrent to child abuse, effectively intervening in the lives of children threatened by abuse requires a shared responsibility.

Many groups and nonprofit organizations are working to stop abuse of children. CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates) is one such group. CASA of Kings County, a program of Champions Recovery, held a swearing in ceremony on Tuesday, May 1 at the Kings County Superior Court for 13 new CASA volunteers.

"This is the first CASA program in Kings County and marks the beginning of CASA volunteers taking an active role in the lives of abused and neglected children in our community," said Sue Weisenhaus, executive director. "The program would not exist without the community and community support."

CASA are recruited and trained to pro-

vide child protection judges with vital information about the very complex lives of court-involved children and their families.

"CASA provides a clear and constant voice for abused and neglected children that have been placed in the foster care and the child welfare system. There are 372 cases in Kings County alone. Our CASA program is committed to making sure that every child in need has access to a CASA volunteer," explained Bob Hulsey, program director. Volunteer advocates spend time with abused and neglected children. They get involved in court pro-

Repaving Reeves

A major repaving project will affect traffic flow from May through July on Reeves Blvd. During the first phase of the project, which is scheduled to begin May 9, traffic will be one lane, stop and go type, for approximately four weeks on nearly one-mile of road just north of

Resident Energy Conservation Program to launch Navy-wide

WASHINGTON (NNS) — Commander, Navy Installations Command will expand the scope of the Resident Energy Conservation Program (RECP) for Public Private Venture (PPV) housing in the U.S. in phases beginning in October 2012.

RECP transfers the responsibility for payment of utilities from the PPV project to the residents, consistent with OSD policy. Research indicates that residents use less when their rent does not include utilities.

In 1998, OSD established policy requiring the transfer of responsibility for the payment of utilities from our PPV project owner to the residents. RECP was created to promote the responsible use of energy in Navy/Marine Corps PPV housing. RECP focuses on utility conservation efforts to reduce electricity and gas usage in PPV housing.

In January 2011 the RECP pilot program transferred responsibility for payment of utilities to residents living in PPV housing in Hawaii and in Marine Corps Housing at Parris Island and Beaufort, S.C. The pilot program reduced electricity usage by almost 10 percent and generated savings in excess of \$1M to reinvest into the PPV housing project to fund reserve accounts used to sustain the financial health of the projects.

"RECP was a great success in Hawaii and Beaufort because our service members and their families increased their awareness of their electricity use resulting in conservation of energy without sacrificing comfort," said Corky Vazquez, CNIC Housing Program manager. "When we reduce our energy consumption, we save money. The money we save will be reinvested into the housing communities in which our Sailors and their families live. These funds will be used to improve the homes and neighborhoods."

The RECP methodology works like this: like type groups of homes are metered and their utility usage is measured monthly (water excluded) to develop an average usage. A buffer of 10 percent is applied above and below the average to create an average

usage band - residents with usage above the band for their like type group pay and those under will receive a rebate. The program starts with a communication phase followed by a mock "trial" billing period that prepares residents for "live billing."

The schedule for the RECP Navy-wide rollout will be in phases depending upon whether meters are in place and the project is ready to implement. During 2013 all PPV projects will start live billing. The tentative roll out schedule for live billing is shown by Region of the country as follows (check with the local housing office for more details):

- *New Orleans: January 2013
- *Northwest, Midwest, Southeast: April 2013
- *Southwest: July 2013
- *Mid-Atlantic and Northeast: October 2013

For more specific information about when the RECP will roll out for a specific installation contact your local Navy housing office; a master list of all Navy installation housing offices is available at www.cnic.navy.mil/housing.

Secretary of the Navy Ray Mabus laid out five aggressive energy goals in October 2009 to improve our energy security and efficiency, increase our energy independence, and help lead the nation toward a clean energy economy. This initiative assists in achieving the energy goal of increasing alternative energy afloat and ashore where by 2020, the Department of the Navy (DON) will produce at least 50 percent of shore-based energy requirements from alternative sources and 50 percent of DON installations will be net-zero.

Military funeral honors

The Department of Defense (DOD) provides military funeral honors at the burials of veterans on request from family members. Funeral honors can be given at private or government-operated cemeteries. As provided by law, an honor guard detail for the burial of an eligible veteran shall consist of not less than two members of the armed forces. One member of the detail shall be a representative of the parent service of the deceased veteran. The honor detail will, at a minimum, perform a ceremony that includes the folding and presenting of the American flag to the next of kin and the playing of "Taps."

Military families of eligible veterans request funeral honors through their funeral home

director. Funeral home directors can request funeral honors from the DoD, whether burial is in a national cemetery or another cemetery.

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) staff at national cemeteries also can assist to arrange funeral honors at VA national cemeteries. Your funeral home director will assist you in obtaining a flag. More information on burial flags is available at <http://www.cem.va.gov/bbene/bflags.asp>.

A Presidential Memorial Certificate will be provided upon request. This is a parchment certificate with an inscription expressing the nation's grateful recognition of an honorably discharged, deceased veteran's service in the armed forces. The veteran's name is inscribed and the certificate bears the signature of the President.

For information about requesting a Presidential Memorial Certificate and additional information refer to <http://www.cem.va.gov/pmc.asp>. The DoD main-

tains a military funeral honors web site at www.militaryfuneralhonors.osd.mil.

Our office can also assist with making these arrangements along with ordering flags, headstones and grave markers.

Expert answers to common DMV questions

Q I just made my last loan payment and now have a signed-off title from my bank. What should I do now?

A. You should submit your signed-off title to DMV with a \$15 transfer fee as soon as possible. It's important to remove the legal owner from the title. This prevents any issues should you decide to sell or trade your vehicle since it's more time con-

suming and costs more (duplicate title fee) to obtain a lien release down the road. For more information about car titles visit www.DMV.ca.gov.

Q: What should I do when approaching a traffic signal that is not functioning due to a power failure?

A: It is not uncommon for traffic signals to be affected by power outages. When this happens treat the intersection as if it were controlled by a four-way stop sign. This means that you must come to a complete stop and then proceed with caution once you have the right-of-way. Be sure to use extra caution in this situation. For more information about right-of-way laws, consult the California Driver Handbook, which is available online at www.DMV.ca.gov.

Q. I've heard the laws recently changed regarding children

need to be in a car seat. What do I need to know about transporting my children, ages five and seven?

A: Vehicle child safety laws were changed on January 1, 2012. The new law requires children to be secured in an appropriate child passenger restraint (safety seat or booster seat) in the back seat of the vehicle until they are at least eight years old or 4' 9" in height.

Q: I'm not operating my vehicle, although the registration fees are current and I've canceled the insurance.

Now I am getting notices of "Intent to Suspend." What should I do?

A: When your registration fees are current and you are not operating your vehicle, you must submit an "Affidavit of Non-Use," REG. 5090 form. This notification will stop the insurance suspension action.

More 'not-so-funnies'

On the spectrum of mishaps, from first aid to last rites, most of the events fall into the former category. They offer valid lessons, dramatized by the presence of pain and blood. But just because most days you don't have a mishap, and just because when you do have one it is usually minor, that doesn't mean you shouldn't take every precaution you can think of to avoid rolling the dice. You just aren't always aware of how bad it might be.

Here are four more examples.

In Florida, an aviation machinist's mate second class was changing the oil on his car. When his wife came home for lunch, she checked on his progress and saw his legs sticking out from under the car, which was lying on his body. Apparently, he had jacked up the car, removed the front passenger wheel, shoved an oil-collection pan under the engine and then slid under himself. The car fell off the jack. He couldn't breathe.

Mishap investigators found this warning on the jack: "To avoid personal injury, do not get bodily under a vehicle that is supported only by a jack. Use vehicle support stands."

Neighbors called 911, but paramedics were unable to revive the AD2.

"Member should have changed vehicle's oil at the hobby shop on base," the report added. Barring that, jack stands aren't that expensive.

In North Carolina, a lance corporal spent several hours one night socializing and drinking. Forty-seven minutes after midnight, the officer on duty got a phone call. Someone had found the lance corporal sprawled on the ground next to a building, where he had landed after falling off a third-floor balcony.

His injuries included a broken pelvis, fractured spine, broken ribs, a punctured and collapsed lung, and a fractured skull. Doctors weren't sure he'd ever be able to fully use his left arm.

I don't know how many times, during the past ten years, we've written about the combination of balconies and drunken Sailors or Marines. It never bodes well. Is it the lure of the fresh air? The improved view? The ability to heckle passers-by?

Once you're sloshed, either stay inside or take the elevator down to ground level.

Also in North Carolina, an E-6 left a bar and headed out into the night on his Harley. Reportedly, he'd had four beers and mixed drinks during the previous six hours. Whether that's true or not, the only things that mattered were that his B.A.C. was 0.16, that he was in enough of a hurry to try to pass a car in a no-passing zone, and that a law-abiding civilian in a Toyota had slowed down to 20 mph to make a left turn.

During the crash, the E-6 was ejected, suffering severe head injuries. He was taken off life support and declared dead two days later.

While on pre-deployment leave, an E-4 rented a 450cc ATV and took it out to some sand dunes in California. He hadn't been there before, but that didn't keep him from racing over a ridge on a dune. ATV and rider became airborne and separated. The E-4's body ended up 40-45 feet from the bottom of the ridge. "There were no tire marks on the down slope of the sand dune," the report said.

"Recommend ORM-type planning and a recon of the area be done before any off-road vehicle is used," the report added. You'd think that common sense would dictate some recon anyway, but common sense isn't so common.

The report also recommended that "all personnel who operate an off-road vehicle attend a rider safety course," also good advice, but the report added that such a course was unavailable locally.

Although the report said the E-4's speed was unknown, it also said he "willfully exceeded the speed limit." Whether there are speed limits on sand dunes is an open

First Seabee Mud Run to offer challenges

More than 400 people have registered for the 1st Annual Seabee Mud Run scheduled for May 26 at the dirt track behind the NAS Lemoore main-side gym.

The Mud Run, which is open to military and civilians, consists of team and individual-based events stretched over a five-mile course of mixed terrains and wet obstacles including ditches, trenches, mud pits, hills and tires. The course is physically and mentally challenging and designed to test the participants' stamina, speed, endurance and teamwork.

Builder 2nd Class Jonathan Kessell, of Construction Battalion Maintenance Unit (CBMU) 303 Detachment Lemoore, said the team-oriented event is one way to increase the bond between the military and the surrounding community.

"Seabees are always looking for ways to increase the morale and relationship amongst the military and local community," said Kessell, assistant coordinator of the event. "Hosting this event every year will be a great way to increase the camaraderie among the military and civilian personnel."

Kessell said the track is currently 90 percent complete. The Seabees only

have to add the finishing touches such as filling the mud pits with water, adding low-crawl areas, setting tires and tying line.

So far, 15 military and civilian teams have signed up, Kessell said. Teams

"Today marks the transition from the ship's storied naval career to a brand new career as a museum and memorial that will serve for generations to come," said Skinner. "I look forward to seeing her brought back to life for public display, continuing to serve our country and its citizens in a new capacity."

Due to system changes taking place during the transition from United Concordia to MetLife, there are approximately 7,000-8,000 TRICARE Dental Program enrollees (mostly National Guard and Reserve members) paying monthly premiums by payroll deduction who will now be directly billed by MetLife. Enrollees receiving a paper bill should make their premium payment by check, electronic funds transfer, or credit card until the payroll deduction option is available again. Enrollees affected by this issue won't be disenrolled.

TMA and MetLife are working on a solution, and MetLife will continue to communicate closely with affected beneficiaries.

Military pharmacy

You may have prescriptions filled (up to a 90-day supply for most medications) at a military treatment facility (MTF) pharmacy free of charge.

Not all medications are available at MTF pharmacies. Each facility is required to make available those medications listed on the Basic Core Formulary (BCF). These medications must be readily available at all military pharmacies worldwide. MTFs may add other medications to their local formularies based on the scope of care at each MTF. It's a good idea to call the MTF pharmacy (559) 998-4499 before trying to get prescription filled at the to make sure the MTF carries the medication you need.

Pharmacy costs

Active duty service members (including activated Guard/Reserve members) pay nothing for covered prescriptions. In some cases, service members may have to pay up

front and file a claim for a full reimbursement.

For all other beneficiaries, prescription costs are based on the type of medication and where it's filled.


